1.	A child asks you what you have behind your ears. She is curious, not teasing.	Some students come up to you and start making fun of your hearing devices.	You are in a new school. No one knows that you wear hearing aids. You don’t want them to judge you when they see the hearing aids, but you know you can’t “fake it” well enough to not use them. Who do you disclose (tell about) your hearing loss to? How? When?
2.	You are sitting in the back of the classroom and find it hard to hear and understand what the teacher is saying.	You want to sit at a desk in your classroom so that you can hear and understand your best when the teacher is talking.	Your teacher assigns seating and you are often seated in the back of the room.
3.	Your teacher starts the morning lesson. He has forgotten to put on the FM/DM microphone.	A new teacher is using the FM/DM microphone. You hear a loud rustling sound as it rubs against her scarf.	Your new teacher does not want to use the FM/DM system and says you just need to pay attention.
4.	One of your hearing aids gets broken into three pieces while you were playing.	When you are replacing your hearing aids one morning you realize there are only 2 batteries left in the pack.	At lunchtime, one of your hearing aids falls into your drink.
5.	Your teacher forgot to mute the FM/DM microphone when she went to the bathroom.	Your teacher has forgotten to mute the FM/DM microphone and you hear what she is saying to another teacher at the classroom door.	You are in a new class and often hear the voice of the teacher next door. It is interfering with your understanding.
6.	Your teacher is facing the whiteboard, writing out math problems as she speaks. It is difficult for you to understand what she says.	Your teacher is roaming about the classroom as she presents the lesson. It is hard for you to see her, listen, and understand.	Your teacher requires you to take notes during the lecture.

7.	You didn't hear the page number that everyone is now turning to in the book.	Your teacher has explained directions and your classmates have started work. You do not understand what to do.	You can never understand the announcements so you've stopped listening to them.
8.	The teacher is using some new words (vocabulary) and you can't understand what she's talking about.	You are struggling in Science because there are a lot of difficult vocabulary words that you don't understand.
