

Students with hearing loss are not exposed to new vocabulary at the same rate as peers due to decreased overhearing, and they require knowledge of morphology to assist them in unlocking the meaning of new words. With Latin and Greek Roots: Teaching Vocabulary Using Hands-On Activities and Common Objects students will master a comprehensive set of high-frequency root words. Forty complete lesson plans feature hands-on activities in which students discover a Latin or Greek root. For example, students use reading glasses to make print visible, draw an object that is invisible to them, and greet visitors in an effort to discover the meaning of the Latin root, vis (to see).

Within the discovery section of the lessons, the teacher engages in an **ongoing dialogue with the students** to purposefully guide them through the discovery process. **Writing activities reinforce** new vocabulary and help students extend their use of the Latin and Greek roots. **The pre/posttest is included to document student progress.**



Students with hearing loss are typically delayed in their development of pragmatic language skills. One important component of <u>pragmatic language</u> is interpreting nonverbal language. This book provides helpful lessons and a pre-test/post-test.

Lessons on posture, hand gestures, facial expression, personal space, and more help students improve their social skills. The activity pages consist of interesting graphic organizers, photos, and art supported with specific, clear directions.

Targeted skills include:

- interpreting others' emotions
- understanding and using appropriate facial expressions and body language to enhance communication
- controlling distracting movements
- using appropriate listening behaviors
- interpretation and use of appropriate eye contact
- maintaining appropriate physical distance from others
- recognizing when someone looks friendly (and using a friendly expression)

- how to handle secrets and tattling



Students with hearing loss all too often have deficits in how appropriately they communicate with others. It is typical for them to have <u>pragmatic language delays</u> that impact social interactions, sometimes in a subtle manner.

Here is a developmental, evidence-based program for social language skills. This program is based on the results of the *Social Language Development Test Elementary*, research, and practical experience. Students learn to recognize, understand, and successfully deal with positive and negative social situations. Units

of the book are arranged in order of general skill complexity and development.

Students focus on specific social language skills while using the activity sheets for discussion; sharing related personal experiences; and scripting, if necessary. Scene illustrations segue into role-playing. The need for writing is minimal.



This is often due to lack of complete access hearing/receiving the directions, but also can be due to poor understanding of the language related to following directions. Every teacher, deaf/hard of hearing program, and many parents, can benefit from using these materials to assist the student with hearing loss in day-to-day function in the classroom.

Help your students with communication difficulties learn to listen and follow directions in the classroom and in test-taking.



Children with hearing loss are targets for teasing by peers. For a healthy self-concept, they need to learn to anticipate that they WILL be teased or bullied and provided strategies for WHAT to do WHEN this happens. Teasing often begins by age 4 and can be an early contributor to students feeling socially isolated and/or resisting hearing device use. This short, engaging book is perfect for teachers and parents to use in helping develop children's

resilience to teasing.

Children learn what bullying is and why it's important to stand up for themselves. The fun, repetitive format and charming illustrations generate enthusiasm.

The questions posed on every page engage youngsters to respond and, in the process, the children learn how to stand up to harassment and bullying.

Can You Stand Up for Yourself? includes teaching suggestions, lesson tips, and follow-up activities.

An introduction page for the child defines the target social skill, cites some relevant examples of the positive behavior, and gives an overview of why the skill is important.

Students with hearing loss often do not hear all of the phonemes of speech, which causes delays in understanding all of the grammatical structures similar to

age peers. Systematically teaching specific syntactic forms helps students with hearing loss to strengthen their understanding of language structures they do not consistently hear.

Grammar Chipper Chat is an exciting magnetic chip game that explores 16 of the grammatical structures found on most language assessments, including the CELF and the TOLD. Each grammar area has 20 or 30 color-coded question cards (400 cards total!) with a sentence prompt on one side and picture(s) on the other side. The student fills in the missing word on the question side using the pictures as cues.







Written by an individual that experienced the challenges of being a 'one and only' in her school with an FM system. This book is fun and funny, heartwarming and encouraging. It is great for parents to share with their child with hearing loss and for teachers to use as a basis of self-concept, social communication, self-advocacy and other teaching activities.

Going to school and making new friends can be tough. But going to school and making new friends while wearing a bulky hearing aid strapped to your chest? That requires superpowers! In this funny, poignant graphic novel memoir, author/illustrator Cece Bell chronicles her hearing loss at a young age and her subsequent experiences with the Phonic Ear, a very powerful—and very awkward—hearing aid.



Written by a dad of a child who is deaf and has multiple disabilities, the book talks about the joys, hopes, dreams, concerns, and issues of raising a child with special needs.

The author talks about his and his family's life, and how his son's special needs have changed - often for the positive - their lives.

The book is organized by topics and is written as a series of articles and short stories that explain these topics and their impact on the family, in an often uplifting and poignant way as the child moves from childhood to adulthood.

Topics include a number of different issues including areas such as being the parent of a child with special needs, perseverance, hope, travel, school, as well as many others.

The author approaches these topics from a unique perspective. Besides being a parent of a child with special needs, he is also the training coordinator for parents and families for a statewide project and works with families, and educational professionals across the state of Florida.
